Mr Andrew Kidd, Rosehill, North Latch, Brechin, the proprietor of Simpson's Garage, Brechin, was named yesterday as the man who died in the car crash near West Mains of Keithock on Wednesday night. Mr Kidd would have been 45 today.

He died from injuries received when his Jaguar car rolled on top of him after he had been thrown out.

Death of Mr Fergus Stewart

Mr Fergus Stewart, a well-known former Dundee opera singer, died suddenly at home on Saturday.

Mr Stewart, who was in his seventies, played many principal roles in light and grand opera with Dundee Operatic Society.

He was a life member of the society and held National Operatic and Dramatic Association awards recognising over 50 years on the opera stage.

A native of Brechin, he joined Brechin Cathedral choir in 1917.

After moving to Dundee, he joined St John's (Cross) Parish Church and was bass leader of the choir there for more than 40 years. He was also an elder of the church.

Mr Stewart, who retired eight years ago from D. C. Thomson & Co., Ltd., Dundee, where he worked for 40 years in the caseroom, was also a keen bowler.

He was a member of Lochee Bowling Club for many years and was president in 1961. He won the club championship in 1962, and the same year was champion of champions of the City of Dundee Bowling Association.

Mr Stewart is survived by his wife, son and daughter. The accident took place on the narrow, winding road which connects the Edzell road to Little Brechin.

Mr Kidd, the only person in the car, had been following his close friend, Mr Alan Christie, a nother Brechin business man who was ahead of him in his own car. Mr Christie said yesterday, "I saw Andrew's headlights flash and I turned round to see that the Jaguar had gone into the ditch and he was under it.

"An ambulance was called and then a man came along and, between us, we managed to free Andrew.

"This man thumped him to get him breathing again but I understand that he had died by the time the ambulance reached Stracathro Hospital."

Mr Christie said that Mr Kidd had been flung out of his car which had skidded along on its side and toppled over on him, landing on its wheels. The car was badly damaged.

Mr Kidd was a Dundee man who remained for a time with the family bakery business of Andrew G. Kidd after it had been taken over.

He and his wife, Mrs Dorothea Kidd, took over the Brechin garage of A. Simpson and Son, Clerk Street.

The family moved to Brechin some time after the takeover.

Mr Kidd was a member of Edzell Golf Club and treasurer of Brechin Castle Curling Club. In addition to his wife, he is survived by a ron, Graham, who works in Ellon and another son and daughter, Derek and Lesley, who are pupils of Brechin High

MR ANDREW G. KIDD DEAD

Mr Andrew G. Kidd died at his residen 64 Dalkeith Road, Dundee, yesterday. 84

Head of the firm of Andrew G. Kidd. Ltd., bakers and confectioners, with head-quarters at 26 Reform Street, he had been



in the baking trade for 70 years. He had developed the business from the smallest of beginnings 65 years ago to be one of the leading bakery businesses in the district.

His health had not been good for two years, but he maintained an active interest in the business.

A native of Dundee, he was the second son of Councillor A, G. Kidd. He received son of Councillor A, G. Kidd. He neceived his education at High School. An illness in his school days resulted in almost total deafness, and to overcome the difficulty he had special training in London. When 14, he entered the baking business and had experience with his father before starting in business on his own. His first bakery was in Sugar House Wynd, off the Sengate. His one shop was at 8 Reform Street, and his staff at first numbered fewer than half a dozen. a dozen.

Little progress was made until he settled down in Baffin Street bakery, where he had begun working with his father. Business expanded. More shops were opened, and the firm's reputation for high-class catering was established by his sister, Miss J. T. Kidd, who was in charge of the Reform Street

A new bakery in Lytton Street was built in 1920. Three years later it was enlarged. To-day the firm has 54 shops in Dundee and one in Perth, with close on 400
